

How To Use This Resource Kit

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) Center for Excellence has developed this resource kit to help you and your community understand and prevent FASD. “FASD” is a term that describes a range of lifelong effects that can occur in someone whose mother drank alcohol during pregnancy. The materials in this kit have been specially designed for the needs of American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian communities, which we will also refer to as “Native communities.” FASD is 100 percent preventable, so it is important for everyone to share the message of prevention and hope with mothers-to-be, policymakers, health professionals, and family and community members.

What Are the Goals of the Resource Kit?

The goals of the resource kit are to:

- ❖ Increase knowledge about FASD prevention in Native communities
- ❖ Provide Native communities with user-friendly materials that support FASD prevention
- ❖ Help people understand that if a mother drinks alcohol during pregnancy, she may give birth to a child with an FASD
- ❖ Give people the tools to support loved ones and community members in being alcohol-free mothers

Who Should Read This Information?

The resource kit was made for anyone who has an interest in working to strengthen Native communities by reducing FASD. It is for friends, relatives, health professionals, tribal leaders, and educators—to name



a few groups—including people with no knowledge about FASD. You may choose the parts of the resource kit that best meet your needs, or read everything for a broader overview.

How Should the Kit Be Used?

We encourage you to copy any of the pieces in the resource kit to share with others in your family, State, territory, community, or tribe. You may fax information sheets to friends, use the information for a school report, make copies of a brochure to hand out at a community meeting, give copies of the fact sheets to patients who are pregnant or thinking of becoming pregnant—whatever uses you can think of.

What Does This Kit Include?

The resource kit includes information to help everyone understand what FASD is and how to help prevent it. It also contains:

- ❖ Current data and statistics on FASD
- ❖ Everyday strategies to assist your community with FASD education and prevention
- ❖ Suggestions for collaborating with other people, agencies, and organizations to enhance FASD services
- ❖ Tips on how to seek help for yourself and how to help others
- ❖ Specific information for men, youth, women, and communities
- ❖ Two posters
- ❖ A CD with an electronic version of the entire resource kit and *FASD—The Basics*, a resource for presentations

How Was the Kit Developed?

All items in the resource kit were developed and reviewed by a committee of experts for quality and relevance. The committee included representatives from American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian communities, as well as professionals in the field of FASD.
